

#### **Know Your Hairitage: Story Time Assembly**

Duration: 45 Minutes | Format: Interactive Literacy & Storytelling Experience

#### Program Overview

The Story Time Assembly brings literacy to life through engaging, interactive read-alouds led by Award-Winning Author Zenda Walker. This program blends storytelling, call-and-response, and hands-on activities to amplify English Language Arts skills while celebrating cultural heritage. Customizable for classrooms or full-school assemblies, this experience strengthens reading comprehension, oral language, and student engagement.

#### **Session Flow**

1. Welcome & Introduction (10 min)

Warm-up activity: "Story Sparks" (students share their favorite story or character).

Overview of session goals: literacy, creativity, and connection.

2. Interactive Story Time (30-40 min)

Live reading of Know Your Hairitage titles or related children's books.

Incorporates call-and-response, student participation, and historical context.

3. Show & Tell / Hands-On Activity (20–30 min)

#### **Know Your Hairitage: Hair Science for Kids**

Duration: 1-2 Hours | Format: Interactive STEM & Biology Workshop

#### Program Overview

The Hair Science for Kids Workshop transforms the biology of hair into a fun, hands-on learning experience for K-12 students. Rooted in STEM education and aligned with academic standards, this program uses hair textures and porosity testing as a gateway to discovery, critical thinking, and personal care practices. Students leave with both scientific knowledge and practical skills they can apply in everyday life.

#### **Session Flow**

1. Welcome & Curiosity Spark (15 min)

Icebreaker: "What do you already know about your hair?"

Overview of goals: science, self-discovery, and health.

2. The Science of Hair (30 min)

Explore hair biology: structure, cuticle layers, and the role of porosity.

Compare across three hair textures to show diversity in biology.

Students perform guided hair porosity tests using safe, simple experiments.

Record results, analyze patterns, and discuss findings as a group.

4. Best Practices for Hair Health (20 min)




